Brazos County Drug Dealers Headed to Prison

Bryan, TX – Several drug dealers are headed to prison after being convicted this week in the 361st District Court.

1.

Raul Saucedo was sentenced to 25 years in prison after pleading guilty to Evading Arrest with a Vehicle. In May of 2013, Bryan Narcotics Detectives were watching the home of a suspected cocaine dealer when they saw an apparent sale of a large amount of drugs to Saucedo. When police tried to stop Saucedo's truck, he fled and initially eluded officers but was apprehended a short time later having abandoned his truck.

Preston Wiggins III pled guilty to Possession of Cocaine with Intent to Deliver and was sen-

tenced to 17 years in prison. Wiggins was arrested by Bryan Police Officers conducting a narcotics investigation. Officers discovered approximately 100 grams of cocaine in the possession of Wiggins and two other men. Wiggins' criminal history includes convictions for prior drug offenses and assaulting a public servant.

Reginald Ginn was sentenced to 14 years in prison after pleading guilty to Possession of Cocaine with Intent to Deliver. In July of 2012, Bryan Police Department Narcotics Officers raided Ginn's home. They discovered approximately 50 grams of cocaine and digital scales used for weighing out smaller amounts of drugs. Ginn's criminal history includes

convictions for possession of controlled substances, theft, fleeing police and furnishing alcohol to a minor.

Robert Densley was sentenced to five years in prison after pleading guilty to possessing cocaine. Following a traffic stop in Bryan in December of 2012, a police drug dog detected the presence of narcotics in the car Densley was driving. Officers then discovered approximately five grams of cocaine inside the car. Densley's criminal history includes convictions for drug offenses, burglary, theft, evading arrest and resisting arrest.

These cases were prosecuted by Assistant District Attorneys, Ryan Calvert, Kevin Capps, and Philip McLemore.
